**Three important tax credits.** A tax credit reduces the amount of income tax you owe and can even put money in your pocket. Here are three important credits for lower-income taxpayers:

- 3 The Economic Impact Payments** (EIP or “Stimulus Funds”) you may have gotten in 2020 and 2021 were actually advance payments on an IRS tax credit, which is called the **Recovery Rebate Credit**.
