Credits can reduce the amount of tax you owe or increase your tax refund, and some credits may give you a refund even if you don't owe any tax.

- You can file your taxes for free, with help from tax-prep software, using IRS Free File: www.irs.gov/filing/free-file-do-your-federal-taxes-for-free
- Free tax prep help. Some taxpayers, especially 1) low- and moderate-income people, 2) those with disabilities, 3) those who have Limited English Proficiency, and 4) people 60 or older may qualify for free tax prep help: www.irs.gov/individuals/free-tax-return-preparation-for-qualifying-taxpayers
