



Checklist: Applying for Expungements through the Michigan Courts

While Michigan's "Automatic Expungement" system expunges some old criminal conviction records automatically, people seeking record expungements may still want or need to go through courts. This list helps people track the steps to take while applying for adult criminal records expungements. This is not a legal advice. It does not cover juvenile adjudications.

1.	Identifying Michigan criminal conviction records			
	 a. Use an <u>ICHAT (criminal record)</u>. Sometimes ICHATS are incomplete, so think about whether any convictions are missing. b. If possible, get legal advice on what records will be expungeable through the courts. 	a. Get records from the court(s) where you were convictedb. Note: there is often a fee of \$10 per request, plus \$1 for each additional page			
3.	Get an official set of fingerprints			
	 a. You can do this at most local police and sheriff stations, or state police posts b. There might be a charge c. You might need to schedule an appointment time d. Make sure the fingerprint card is complete, and that all boxes are filled out 			
4.	Complete the expungement application (Form MC 227)			
	 a. There is a separate form for misdemeanor marijuana convictions (MC 227a) b. When you sign the form, your signature must be notarized c. Michigan court forms are at: https://www.courts.michigan.gov/SCAO-forms/Michigan-court-forms/ 			
5.	File the application with the court			
	 File the application in the court where you were convicted, keeping a copy fo yourself
